#### PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

A reminder that Kindergarten registration for sibling takes place between January 9-13. If your child turns 5 in 2023, you're eligible to register them on the portal for Kindergarten for the 2023/24 school year.

Similarly, registration for grade 8 also takes place via the portal on February 13<sup>th</sup>, starting at 12:00pm (noon). It is important to register early as slots get taken up very quickly for both Kindergarten and Grade 8 registration.

A huge shout-out to our generous PAC who again supported our school by providing funds to the school to purchase many different items for our classrooms. Your generosity is truly appreciated. And we are continually grateful to our hardworking PAC for providing hot lunches on Wednesdays. We appreciate the work you put in to offer choice for our students.

#### ATTENDANCE REMINDER PARENT

If your child will be absent from school, arriving late, or being picked up early, please be sure to mark this either on the parent portal, by email at <u>are\_reception@sd42.ca</u>, or by phone at 604-463-3035. If your child is marked absent and has not been excused by a parent this will come up on our call sheet. We will contact all numbers we have in attempt to confirm that your child is safe. Lately, as you can imagine, we have been inundated with a high volume of calling home due to no communication from the parent that their child will not be attending that day.

#### VISITORS OR DROPPING ITEMS OFF

For safety reasons, all visitors and volunteers are required to sign-in, sign-out and wear a visitor's tag while in the building or on the school grounds outside.

If you have a message or something to drop off for your child, you may do so through the office.

#### KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION DATES FOR THE 2024-25 SCHOOL YEAR

All students registering for kindergarten must be 5 years **on or before December 31**, **2024**. Registration dates are posted on the School District Website. Kindergarten registration is done on the Parent Portal. Registration opens at 12:00pm (noon) on the first day of each registration phase.

#### GRADE 8 REGISTRATION FOR THE 2024-25 SCHOOL YEAR

Grade 8 registration for the 2024-25 school year is done on the parent portal. Online registration begins on February 13, 2024 at 12:00pm (noon) and closes on February 27, 2024 at 11:59pm. The online registration form will automatically populate with your child's secondary catchment school. This is determined by your address. <u>Please take a moment to ensure your parent portal account has your current address</u>. Any change of student's address needs to be done at the office along with two supporting documents. This information will not update in the portal until the next day.

#### GRADE 5 Survey:

In January and February students in Grade 5 will participate in the Middle-Years Development Instrument (MDI).

#### MDI:

The MDI is a confidential self-reporting questionnaire that is completed online during approximately an hour of school time. It is widely considered to be an important and useful tool for planning school and community services. The MDI is not an assessment of individual children, but rather a survey of the population at large. Among other things, it is used to determine what afterschool services, community programs, and facilities are most needed in our neighbourhoods. Participation in the MDI is encouraged but not mandatory - should you wish to exempt your child the forms required to do so were sent out on the portal before the winter break.

#### SPARE CHANGE OF CLOTHES

Please be sure to send your child to school with a spare change of clothes that they can keep at school. So, when they show up to class like this after recess or lunch, they have a spare change of clothes to change into!

#### OUTDOOR PLAY IN WINTER



There are many benefits for our young students to get outdoor breaks during the school day, even in the winter months. Many of us grew up being told that the cold weather makes us sick. That is simply not true! Illnesses like the cold and the flu are caused by viruses, not cold weather. Spending time outside in the winter months improves our immune systems and gives us an escape from all the germs and bacteria that are huddled up indoors. Outdoor recess time provides children with a brain break and helps them get their bodies ready for

more learning. Spending time outdoors in the winter provides us with Vitamin D which is essential for children's physical well-being and their emotional well-being. Vitamin D has been found to change serotonin levels in the brain. Serotonin is a hormone that is important in regulating mood. In other words, spending time outside may help children manage their emotions and improve their self-regulation.

Making sure that your children have the proper clothing for outdoor play will help them enjoy the time they spend outside at recess. Dressing in layers is always a great idea in our climate!

#### SCHOOL CLOSURE DECISION: SNOW

The decision to close schools due to accumulating snowfall is the responsibility of the superintendent, who must balance the safety of students, staff, and parents with the need to provide learning. The decision is not taken lightly and is the result of a carefully thought-out process that is reviewed after each experience and refined if necessary.
