Student Led Conferences, Nov. 28, 29

The upcoming conferences are a very positive way to celebrate learning and work together to support learning goals. Now that some students have been doing this for three or four years they have become very comfortable reflecting on their learning and setting goals. You can help prepare for conferences by asking your child how she/he is feeling at school; what her strengths are as a learner; what's one thing easy?; what's one thing difficult.

Traffic at the end of the day

Every school I have been at struggles with traffic congestion at the end of the day. A police officer recently made an observation: "I find it interesting that the same people who become angry and frustrated at schools are okay with waiting 10-15 minutes in a Tim Horton's/Starbuck's line-up". We are only looking at a 10-15 minute period of time. So, for the safety of our students we are asking drivers to model patient, respectful behavior.

Travel at idle speed and follow the rules of the road:

- Park safely and walk your children to school on the sidewalk.
- Use the crosswalk to cross Isaac Crescent.
- Use the drop off and pick up lane for that ONLY if you are going to be out of your car or stopping for more than 1 minute, please park elsewhere.
- When there are children in the building, NEVER park in the drop off lane. It is for emergency vehicles in the case of an emergency.

The Redesigned Curriculum at Alouette Elementary

CURRICULAR COMPETENCIES:

Fostering deeper and more transferable learning

The **Curricular Competencies** are a combination of skills, strategies, processes and habits of mind that students develop over time. They reflect the "Do" in the Know-Do-Understand model of learning. Deeper learning is better achieved through "doing" than through passive listening or reading, and it immerses students in authentic tasks that connect learning to the real world.

Curricular Competencies are subject-specific, and they are linked to the curriculum-wide <u>Core Competencies</u>. A focus on the development of competencies actively engages students in their learning, and helps them to become critical and creative thinkers.

Redesigned Curriculum: Know-Do-Understand

All areas of learning are based on a "Know-Do-Understand" model to support a concept-based, competency-driven approach to learning. In this model, three elements work together to support deeper learning: Content (Know), Curricular Competencies (Do), and Big Ideas (Understand). BC's new curriculum design enables a personalized, flexible and innovative approach at all levels of the education system. All areas of learning have been redesigned using this model.
