In a community as large as ours we can expect there to be some who are of this nature and it is to them we must extend our greatest efforts to be empathic and understanding. When a student or child is struggling to meet the expectations placed on them they need our support not our scorn. Let's find out the "why" of the behaviour and work to solve that. Let's not just respond to the behaviour with punishment as it will be back if the lagging skills are not addressed. A metaphor I like to use is that of a pop bottle. If we simply respond to the behaviour and not the complexity that is underlying it then, like a pop bottle that is shaken, the "explosion" is only being held back and it will erupt at some point. But, if we can figure out what's shaking the bottle and prevent that then the "explosion" will not occur. Stop by my office if you'd like to explore this

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## The Redesigned Curriculum at Edith McDermott

### **CURRICULAR COMPETENCIES:** Fostering deeper and more transferable learning

The Curricular Competencies are a combination of skills, strategies, processes and habits of mind that students develop over time. They reflect the "Do" in the Know-Do-Understand model of learning. Deeper learning is better achieved through "doing" than through passive listening or reading, and it immerses students in authentic tasks that connect learning to the real world.

Curricular Competencies are subject-specific, and they are linked to the curriculum-wide Core Competencies. A focus on the development of competencies actively engages students in their learning, and helps them to become critical and creative thinkers

#### Redesigned Curriculum: Know-Do-Understand

BC's new curriculum design enables a personalized, flexible and innovative approach at all levels of the education system. All areas of learning have been redesigned using this model.
