"The student sessions will focus on lessons and content that is most applicable to the age group in attendance. This presentation will cover all things digital, from digital citizenship to the criminal consequences of cyberbullying. Some of the most prominent concerns currently surrounding student's use of social networking sites and smartphones will be discussed.

Topics covered will include: how to practice netiquette (online etiquette), how to recognize and respond to cyberbullying, the criminal and social consequences of cyberbullying behaviour, self-peer exploitation, digital media habits and oversharing, digital addiction, piracy and plagiarism.



The illusion of anonymity online will be spoken to in cautioning students from

misrepresenting themselves online and creating false profiles. Geo-locational settings will be covered the dangers of social media and cell phone misuse as well. Finally, a discussion of personal media habits will engage the audience and prompt them to reflect on their own digital lives and how it is affecting them."

What is the role of critical and reflective thinking in the development of students?

Critical and reflective thinking is a significant Core Competency that plays an essential role in the development of a child's reasoning skills across all subject areas from kindergarten to Grade 12. When a student analyzes a situation from different perspectives and identities, it widens their students as they develop their critical thinking skills to evolve and substantiate their ideas and are encouraged to act on feedback received by their teachers and peers to adjust and refine their thinking. These skills enable students to form conclusions that reflect research, experimentation, thoughtful discussions, and personal reflect research, experimentation, thoughtful discussions, and personal reflection. Critical thinking skills also represent and responsible decision-making.
