Part 2: The Lost Art of Play

Play is nature's classroom. It's where children try things out, take small risks, and learn the social and emotional skills they'll use for the rest of their lives. In real play, kids practice courage, cooperation, and creativity in ways no screen, or well-intentioned adult directing the play, can replicate.

When children have time for unstructured play with peers, they learn to problem-solve on the spot. They figure out how to handle bumps, both physical and social, and they come out of it more confident and capable. These are the moments that help them discover what they can do, not what we can do for them.

Every time they climb, explore, negotiate, or argue their way through a game, they're wiring their brains for independence and resilience. This is the work of childhood, and play is the medium kids understand best.



But as childhood has moved indoors and online, kids have lost regular opportunities to practice these skills. Safety fears of parents, busier family schedules, and the ease of digital entertainment have all contributed to the decline. The result is a generation that's more monitored yet less confident, more connected online but less practiced in the real-world interactions that form strong social foundations.

Our own school MDI data shows that of our current Grade 6 students, roughly half spend over two hours daily on screens during their free time, with almost 15% logging 4+ hours of daily screen time. This time online replaces the kind of free play that students need to build confidence and resilience. The data reminds us that technology isn't the enemy, but balance is needed.

Family Challenge:

Choose one afternoon this weekend for old-fashioned, unstructured outdoor play.

Adults supervise from a distance, not as referees.

Let kids create the games, solve the squabbles, and decide how the fun ends. Boredom feeds imagination.
