VOLUNTEER DRIVERS

Parent volunteer drivers are very important to the running of school activities. We appreciate your help in enriching the children's learning experiences.

The school board and I.C.B.C. requires that all volunteer drivers have a Driver's Abstract and a Volunteer Driver Form on file at the school BEFORE any driver is allowed to take any child, other than their own, on a school outing. If you plan to help us with driving this year, please complete the necessary forms and check to see if we have a driver's abstract currently on file for you in the office.

Obtaining your driving record (Driver's Abstract)

Your B.C. driving record lists your licensing transactions and offenses over the last 5-year period.

Your driver's abstract can be mailed or faxed to you. It is available by visiting a Driver Licensing Office or by calling the Driver Licensing Information line at 1-800-950-1498 or 250-978-8300 in Victoria, or the Public Information line at 1-800-663-3051. Only the license holder can request this document.

Information & Research on Combined Classes

This year many students are in combined classrooms. Combined classes are a reality in every elementary school, and every child will be in both straight and combined classes during their elementary school years. Some parents can be concerned about possible negative impacts of being in a combined - there is none. With this in mind, we have put together some information below about combined and straight grade classes to help families better understand:

- Research has shown there is no difference in academic achievement between children in split classes versus straight grade classes.
- 2. A single grade class is a multi-grade class as children are all at different stages of development. Every child develops at his/her own rate and pace.
- 3. Three common misconceptions about combined classes.
 - A combined class is comprised of the more capable students in the younger grade and students who struggle in the older grade.
 Truth: Every class is balanced both academically and socially whether it is a straight or combined grade class.
 - If a child is in the older grade with younger students, they will not be challenged.
 <u>Truth</u>: Teachers use differentiated instruction to meet the needs of all the learners in both straight and combined classes. Instruction is customized to students' stages of learning.
 - In a combined class, students will miss grade level curriculum.
 Truth: A teacher in combined classroom is to be able to integrate different subject matters and bring students together to

promote a one-class atmosphere.

- 4. Sometimes, children may remain with a teacher for a second year. There are many benefits in continuing with the same teacher and in the same learning environment for more than one year.
 - The teacher knows the students abilities and is therefore able to provide appropriate instruction.
 - Students can continue a second year with familiar routines and expectations, which naturally leads to leadership skills.
 - The child and teacher have built a relationship of trust over the years. The student becomes extensively familiar with the learning environment and naturally begins to understand himself as a learner and a person.

5. Benefits for the students

- The older students have opportunities for leadership, mentoring and peer support.
 They learn to be positive, mature role models for the younger students.
- The younger children gain selfconfidence and maturity by being exposed to older students.
- There is greater peer-to-peer learning in blended classrooms.
- Students develop friendships across grade levels and instil a greater sense of responsibility for one another, and a better sense of community.

Volunteers & Visitors

The safety of our students is a major priority. If you are in the school to volunteer or just visiting, please remember to sign in at the office and get a Visitor Pass. If a staff member or student sees the Visitor pass they will know you are officially signed in. If you are dropping off a lunch, etc. you will not be required to wear a tag but you must check in at the office. We

appreciate your help to maintain a safe environment in our school. Thank you!

When Biking to School...

If your child rides their bike to school, please tell them to use the bike rack in the inner courtyard. We also ask the students to walk their bikes on school grounds and bring your lock safety.

Scooters/Rollerblades, etc.

School property is a feet only zone. Please walk onto the school grounds carrying your scooters, roller blades, skateboards, etc. to prevent accidents from happening.

Outside Classroom Doors

Students, please remember to use your outside classroom doors to enter and exit the school and **not** the front door.

Cell Phone Use

Please help us preserve the positive learning environment of the classroom. To reduce distractions and disruptions in the classroom from cell phones students are asked to leave all electronic devices in their backpacks during the school day. Emergency calls for your child during the day can be directed through the office and we can send a runner.

Supervision

Supervision is provided at Golden Ears between 8:25 am and 2:25 pm. At least 8 staff members are on duty during recess, and the noon hour.

There is no supervision of students before or after school. The school is not responsible for children arriving early or staying late unless the teacher has requested it. Our school operates a Learning Center out of the library from Tuesday through Thursday and therefore we insist on students being extremely quiet near the front entrance. Those who cannot follow this expectation will be asked to wait outside.

Inclement Weather



Please remember to send a change of clothes with your child to keep in the classroom, if your child tends to get wet and dirty when our rainy weather begins. This would save some phone calls home!

Hospital Homebound Support

Do you have a son or daughter who is ill or injured and unable to attend school?

School District No. 42 provides support to students who are unable to attend school for medical reasons. The Hospital Homebound teacher works with elementary and secondary students who have not been allocated support teacher time through a special needs designation. Students may be absent due to a non-contagious illness or they may be recovering from surgery or an injury. Instruction is provided in Ridge-Meadows Hospital or in the student's home.

How does Hospital Homebound support work?

The Hospital Homebound teacher provides direct instruction and support to students, with the goal of helping them return to class with as little interruption to their education as possible. The teacher also helps students maintain connections with the people and programs at their school. While receiving Hospital Homebound support, students continue to be registered at their school and in their classes. Students work on the core academic subjects. They often use the same materials and complete many of the same assignments as their classmates, although some adaptations may be necessary depending on the child's illness. Students typically receive two to three hours of support each week.

When can a student be referred?

Homebound students qualify for support if they are absent from school for 10 consecutive school days. Students who are hospitalized can be referred upon admittance to Ridge-Meadows Hospital.

How do I refer my son or daughter?

Contact your child's teacher, counsellor, or administrator. He/she will complete the Learning Services referral form. A physician's authorization form is also required (available at the school). The Redesigned Curriculum at Golden Ears Elementary



How has the curriculum been redesigned & how does this benefit student learning?

The BC curriculum has been redesigned to support the changing world students are entering. The redesigned curriculum is student-centred and flexible, maintains a focus on literacy and numeracy skills, and includes Aboriginal perspectives.

Kindergarten to Grade 10 teachers are already using the new curriculum in all our schools. The redesigned curriculum for Grade 11 and 12 is being fully implemented this September.

So how and what will your child be learning? Each month in our school newsletter, we will highlight a key feature of the redesigned curriculum and share stories about how this feature is being implemented in your child's classroom. The Redesigned Curriculum at Golden Ears Elementary

Why does collaboration have a prominent role in the redesigned curriculum?

he ability to work effectively with others has become a critically important skill for career and life success. "Coordinating with others" is listed as one of the 10 skills to thrive by the World Economic Forum.

The *Communication* core competency highlights the importance of effective collaboration by focusing on the development of students' listening skills, students' ability to engage in formal and informal conversation, and their ability to generate and share ideas. When students work together to accomplish goals in areas such as inquiry, problem-solving, and community projects, they incorporate information from multiple sources of knowledge, perspectives, and experiences. Students learn to appreciate different perspectives and also learn to build consensus. As a result, the creativity and quality of the solutions students propose are both enhanced.

The relational importance of learning for all students is also captured by the First Peoples' Principles of Learning, which recognize that learning is a highly social process that builds relationships within the family and the community. Ultimately, this emphasis on relationship "reinforces a way of being in the world that helps shape our actions, as we think about how our actions affect those around us."

Core Competencies: What are they and why are they in the new curriculum?

The new curriculum centres around the following three core competency areas: communication, personal and social, thinking. They are sets of intellectual, personal, and social and emotional proficiencies that all students need to develop in order to engage in deep learning and life-long learning. Competencies are evident in every area of learning and in every grade, and come into play when students become actively engaged in their learning. During the school year, students will have an opportunity to self-assess their proficiencies in these core competencies.
