Picking Your Child Up Early

From time to time, children need to be picked up early from school to attend appointments. Recently, we have had a significant increase in last minute requests which are having an impact on our classrooms and office staff. Moving forward, you can help us by adhering to the following:

- Parents/guardians need to contact their child's classroom teacher (either via email or note in a planner etc) the day before. Please include the time you need to pick your child up so the teacher can send them to the office to wait for you and be signed out.
- 2. If you need to pick up your child on short notice, please contact the office **30 minutes before** you plan to arrive and we will do our best to have your child at the office for pick up.

Please note that it is extremely difficult for us to call children inside once they are outside at recess and lunch. These are not good pick up times.

Following these procedures will help us protect the learning environments of our classrooms by minimizing interruptions.



PINK SHIRT DAY FEBRUARY 26TH

Pink Shirt Day is a day dedicated to raising awareness about bullying and promoting kindness and inclusivity. It originated in Canada in 2007 when a group of students organized a protest in support of a fellow student who was bullied for wearing a pink shirt to school. In response, the organizers distributed pink shirts to classmates, and the movement has since grown into an annual event.
