

Reflecting on a Year in COVID.

The COVID pandemic has created a great many challenges. It has been a challenge for every member of our school community. Together staff, students and parents have worked to keep one another safe. Together we have worked to make adjustments to our daily flow and routine, increasing the amount of contact cleaning, hand sanitation, spacing, and have changed several instructional practices in favour of practices with more personal spacing where and when possible. This has been a great challenge for our instructional staff.

Every day more than 1050 people enter our school. We have very few "forgotten" masks, less than 5 a day, and have an increasing percentage of students who choose to wear their masks in classroom environments where provincial regulations make masks optional. Mask compliance in the common areas is very close to 100%, and the exceptions are most often innocent mistakes as we all forget once in a while.

On January 31, 2021 GSS was identified as the first public school in BC to have an identified case of a COVID variant. At the time Fraser Health leadership tasked more than 80 staff and students to receive immediate testing. I believe it is a testament to the leadership of the school staff that all of the tests were negative. It is also important to recognize the leadership of Fraser Health that supported our community in moving the staff and students to the front of testing availability and developed new practices in a timely and supportive manner. We are indeed fortunate to live where we live and be able to access support for our greater community health.

We are continuing to work hard to support overall community health. Please support us in having positive conversations at home. We know the school community has been challenged this year, with many of the activities that are our heart and soul absent or modified. We look forward to their return, but until then, we need to maintain our positive pace. We need to continue to do the little things that are asked of us, and be sincere in our efforts to keep our school and families safe.

Garibaldi IB Diploma Programme

Garibaldi is one of only 14 public British Columbia International Baccalaureate World Schools. The IB Diploma Program (IB DP) offers students the opportunity to complete their high school education in an internationally-recognized and internationally-focused program that will open many doors to the world of post-secondary education. Even more importantly, the IB Diploma Program exposes students to the wider, international world of lifelong learning by focusing on both depth and breadth of learning in all subject areas.

Students in the IB Diploma Program are given a unique education. They will:

be encouraged to think independently and drive their own learning.

• become knowledgeable, global minded citizens.

• become more culturally aware, through the development of a second language, and through the international focus of the curriculum.

• be able to engage with people in an increasingly globalized, rapidly changing world. The IB Diploma Program is recognized worldwide as the very best preparation for university and college bound students. Students who participate in the Diploma Program unanimously report that their first year at university is much less difficult and stressful because of their experiences in IB DP.

Students considering IB should plan for an academic pathway. While there are no specific required courses, it is important than students planning on a full IB Diploma remain in the Pre Calculus math stream and French. GSS offers a Guided Inquiry elective 9 that supports a positive progression to the grade 11 start of the DP programme.

The DP programme at GSS does not have an admissions assessment. We maintain an open policy supporting students who wish to enter as a full diploma student or certificate student, taking individual courses.

SD42 Enhanced Cleaning in Schools – Vital Oxide

The health and safety of our students and staff is always our primary concern. In the context of the current COVID-19 pandemic, we have the added responsibility of ensuring that our facilities are cleaned and disinfected in accordance with the Provincial COVID-19 Health & Safety Guidelines for K-12 Settings.

The school district uses the Vital Oxide solution as part of its enhanced daily cleaning regimen implemented to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19. It is hypoallergenic, biodegradable, fragrance-free, food-safe, and non-toxic. The product is registered with the Environmental Protection Agency and has one of the safest classifications possible while also killing 99.999% of bacteria and viruses within minutes.

The district initially used a bleach-based cleaner when schools reopened for in-classroom instruction in September but switched to the eco-friendly Vital Oxide in late October/early November to address feedback received from schools. Fraser Health has confirmed that this product is not hazardous and non-toxic, and is not expected to cause respiratory or skin irritation. Eye contact may cause mild irritation.

First Peoples Principles of Learning.

Aboriginal Worldviews and Perspectives in the Classroom



There are 9 First People Principals of Learning. Each is unique and reflective of positive values we look to bring to our school community:

Learning involves patience and time

This principle reflects the awareness that knowledge and understanding is built over time, often requiring a recursive approach to teaching and learning. It reflects the understanding that Indigenous knowledge is the result of centuries of learning and teaching in by Indigenous peoples. This principle directly supports the idea that learning is an individualistic process that cannot be rushed or arrived at according to a pre-determined schedule (including specific age). This refers to the understanding that learning happens when a person is ready for it, and that learning is most effective when it occurs in a setting where the learning can be applied in an authentic context. The need for patience and time is also a requirement to

develop thorough conceptual and transferable understandings, rather than surface level familiarity. In order to develop understanding, information needs to be examined/explored from multiple perspectives, in different contexts, and over time.

In First Peoples' contexts, this understanding of learning is also the result of cultural values of collaboration and taking the time needed to develop consensus. Collaboration requires that all people in a group contribute according to their specific skill sets, or "gifts". Through collaboration group members also learn from each other.

Traditionally, group decisions were often made through consensus rather than by voting, and this requires the time needed for everyone to have a say and be heard. It requires skilled negotiation, a process that also requires patience and time, and encourages people to listen to and understand differing perspectives. And while the process takes longer than a "majority wins" process, decisions that result from the consensus process tend to build stronger communities
