ADMINISTRATION OF MEDICATION AT SCHOOL

If your child requires medication at school on a regular or short-term basis, a "Medical Intervention Form" must be completed and submitted to the school. No medication will be given until the form is completed and returned to the school. All medication needs to be in the original container; this is a School District Board Policy. The school does not provide any medication to students; these need to be provided by the families.

PARENT VOLUNTEER DRIVERS

Throughout the year, classroom teachers will require parent drivers to transport students to out-of-school activities. School Board policy requires that all volunteer drivers have on file at the school a Volunteer Driver Application Form along with a Driver Abstract (record of driving record). The Driver Abstract is obtained from the Government Agent office or you may dial ICBC at 1-800-950-1498 and request them to fax your Abstract to Harry Hooge at 604-463-0821. **These forms are valid for 2 years.** Please check with your teacher prior to the field trip if you are unsure if your volunteer driver form is on file.

STUDENT INCLUSIVE CONFERENCES (Nov. 28th and Nov. 29th)

Student-inclusive conferences are just around the corner. Elementary Schools in School District No. 42 are continuing to communicate student learning for term one and term two through the student inclusive conference and reporting format implemented in previous years. Instead of producing a written report card, teachers will meet with students and parents to conduct a reporting conference. Through the use of student portfolios, parents are able to see a sample of student work in several learning areas and are able to look at their child's progress over time. Parents will also be able to participate in their children's goal setting for second term.

Student-Inclusive Conferences will be held on November 28th and November 29th. All students will be dismissed at 11:30 on November 28th and there will be no classes on November 29th in order to allow time for all students and parents to be able to attend their scheduled conference. Teachers have been and will continue to communicate with parents about how to schedule your child's student-inclusive conference. Please watch for information coming home (e.g. note in planner, email, phone call, portal notice) with regards to a conference time with you and your child.

Parent and student participation is required and critical to the success of this conferencing model.

Having the opportunity to share in this experience individually with each child (free of distractions from siblings) is ideal. Please consider arranging care for siblings. Our purpose is to provide a clear picture of each student's strengths, areas of improvement and to work together to set realistic and attainable learning goals. Students will be active participants in their own reflection about their learning and goal setting. We recognize that this is a shift away from letter grades, a traditional and comparative method for measuring a student's performance. However, research demonstrates that letter grades tell little about a student's learning and can be detrimental to a student's motivation to learn and achieve their best. In addition, we want students to develop the competencies needed to become lifelong learners and productive members of society.
