#### Intermediate Track and Field Meet

Children have been chosen to represent Kanaka Creek at the District Track and Field meet on Thursday, June 7th for Gr. 4 & 5 and Friday, June 8th for Gr. 6 & 7

The meet will take place at Maple Ridge Secondary School; it starts at 8:30 a.m. and finishes at approximately 2:30 p.m. We ask that the children attending be at MRSS at 8:10 a.m. in order to warm up and get organized. Parents are responsible for getting their children to the track meet and home afterwards. Teachers cannot leave until all students are picked up, so please be prompt. Your children are training hard so that they can achieve their individual best in each event in which they are entered. Please continue to encourage your child(ren) in this regard.

Maple Ridge Secondary School will be in full session on both meet days. The parking lots at either end of the school are for staff and students and may not be used by visitors. Parking will not be available at the north end by Mt. Crescent Elementary. Please try to car pool to help cut down on the traffic in the area. Your help and cooperation with the parking situation is much appreciated.

Plenty of spectator seating is available in the grandstand and you are welcome to bring lawn chairs to sit closer to events that are taking place in the various areas around the track. The infield area will be used for marshaling and first aid, and is therefore out-of-bounds to spectators. MRSS Culinary program is hosting a concession where lunch and snacks can be purchased. Please feel free to come and watch your child participate and to cheer on your child's school.

The meet will be a 'rain or shine' event. Please be sure that your child is dressed appropriately for the weather. Please send snacks/lunch, a water bottle, sunscreen, a hat, track pants and sweatshirt and a waterproof coat in case of rain. No valuables should be brought to the track meet, as their security cannot be guaranteed. All students must wear running shoes for all events. No spikes or bare feet are permitted. Students must wear their numbers on the front of their shirts. There will probably be a school banner and/or tent for the children to gather around.

Track and Field events may run ahead of designated times (or behind). As a result, participants should be at the meet one hour before their track and field event. It is the participant's responsibility to be aware of scheduled times in the event schedule. Please remember that the meet is run by volunteers and that mistakes do happen at times. Your consideration is much appreciated by meet organizers and volunteers.


Your child may be part of a relay team. The team depends on the attendance of all of its runners or it cannot run.

# **Office Reminders**

#### 2018/19 Class Placement Planning

During this time of year, we begin to start planning for the next school year. The School District has assigned our tentative staffing allocations and we will be increasing by one division next year. In late June/early July we will begin the process of completing initial class compositions and we will add your input to our extensive list of information regarding your children. Please do not feel you need to give input into class placements, as a great deal of thought and care go into the placement of each child. It is important to note, that the input we do receive does not take precedence over our teachers' input and opinions as we try to develop classes. The input parents provide, often serves as a reminder of what we already know about your child, and it is simply one more piece of information we use during the process of completing classes.

### Many factors are taken into account when creating classes, the main ones being:

- Each child's academic needs
- Each child's social needs
- Emotional consideration for each child
- The number of students per class
- The balance of male to female students
- Each child's learning style
- Fair distribution of students with extraordinary needs

Additional note: Our school composition often changes over the summer (with students moving in and out of the school); therefore, the organizations made in June/July are tentative and cannot be considered permanent. These preliminary organizations form the foundations for final class groupings that occur after the first day of school in September - when we have confirmed our enrollment for each grade level.

Please refer to the school website for the Parent Input Regarding Placement 2018-2019 form. The form posted online outlines the criteria for parent input – which in a nutshell states the letter should include "special and significant educational circumstances" sought, rather than naming a specific teacher.

#### **Combined vs. Single-Grade Classes**

" Combined classes are defined as classes with more than one grade level and one age in a classroom. There are many terms for the combined class structure such as; split grade, multi-age, multi-level and multi-grade. There are several reasons why schools create combined classes. When school staffs look to organize their students, they have to balance the educational needs of their students with the staffing they receive from Human Resources, as well consider the legislated contractual agreement.

There is a good chance that your child will have the experience of being in a combined grade class at some point in their elementary school years. Within the combined class there will be children of both grade levels working at similar levels of performance. Dr. Joel Gajadharsingh, of the University of Saskatchewan, is one of the leading investigators of combined classes in North America. His findings were summarized by the Canadian Education Association and concluded that children achieve at equal levels whether in combined classes or single grade classes. The quality of the learning experience is the same; in fact in some cases, their achievement levels and their ability to get along with other people are as good as, or better, than students in single grade classrooms. Findings also show that in classes where there is more than one age level, children learn to become more independent, responsible learners, have better study skills and attitudes towards school, and develop a greater degree of social responsibility. In standardized tests, students did as well or better in combined classrooms in Math, Language Arts, Science and Social Studies. The School Act, which governs BC schools, stipulates that all teachers must teach the prescribed curriculum. Teaching strategies that address diversity, meet individual needs, and satisfy Ministry requirements with respect to content and processes of learning, work well in both combined and single grade classrooms and can be performed in such ways that students in combined grade classrooms do not repeat or "miss out" on prescribed curriculum.

#### HOW DO WE ASSESS AND CELEBRATE LEARNING?

We Assess and Celebrate Learning? Assessment and the curriculum are interconnected. Assessment is rigorous and based on learning standards, core competencies, literacy and numeracy. Students reflect and self-assess to build important higher-level thinking skills. Students set criteria, design inquiries, and participate in self and peer assessment, as well as setting goals for next steps. Teachers document student learning over time using collections of student work and demonstrations to create a profile of individual strengths, areas of growth, and areas for further development. Through multiple means and varied strategies, the student's learning is made visible, and their successes celebrated.

Core Competencies: What are they and why are they in the new curriculum?

The new curriculum centres around the following three core competency areas: **communication**, **personal and social, thinking.** They are sets of intellectual, personal, and social and emotional proficiencies that all students need to develop in order to engage in deep learning and life-long learning. Competencies are evident in every area of learning and in every grade and come into play when students become actively engaged in their learning. During the school year, students will have an opportunity to self-assess their proficiencies in these core competencies.
