STUDENT VERIFICATION INFORMATION FORMS

We sent home Student Information Sheets with each student the week of September 16th. This is a printout of the contact information and phone numbers we have on record for your child. Please be sure to make any necessary changes on the sheet and return it to your child's teacher. It is important that you return this up-to-date information so we can contact you when necessary.

STUDENT EMERGENCY RELEASE INFORMATION

This <u>must be completed on the portal</u>. The district is holding an earthquake drill on Thursday, October 17, and all teachers will release students to the guardians indicated on the documentation. Please arrive at MRE at 2:00 and line up on the field according to the division of your youngest child.

STUDENTS LATE OR ABSENT

If your child is going to be absent from school or late for any reason, please remember to call the school at (604) 467-5551. An answering service is available 24 hours a day 7 days per week for your convenience. You can also report your child's absence on the parent portal. If we do not have confirmation of absence from home, the office will contact the numbers we have available.

STUDENT PHOTOS

Photo Express will be at our school October 7th to take individual student photos. Don't forget to bring your smiles! Retakes will be on October 29 in the morning.

DRESS FOR THE WEATHER

Students will be outside for recess and lunch most days. We ask that parents ensure their children are dressed appropriately for our rainy west coast weather with a coat, boots and umbrella if necessary. Students must keep a spare change of clothes in their backpacks.

HEAD LICE

To prevent head lice among children at school, we ask that you remind your child to not share personal items such as combs, brushes or hats, and that you check your child's head regularly for the presence of head lice. Early detection and appropriate treatment will significantly reduce head lice in our school.

PARENT PORTAL

If you are not yet on the parent portal, please pop into the office and we will help you do this as it's the most efficient way for parents and guardians to get current information from the school.

Thank-you for submitting fees for supplies and planners. If you haven't completed this, we appreciate you attending to this as soon as possible.

Please complete consent forms that are listed on the portal as soon as possible. We require consents in order to publish any student photos in newsletters, on our website, in our yearbook, or to share with the Board. We also require consent for classes that do nature walks off school grounds. Your earliest attention to this allows us to enhance publications that share all the wonderful things that are happening at MRE!

Hospital Homebound Support

Do you have a son or daughter who is ill or injured and unable to attend school?

School District No. 42 provides support to students who are unable to attend school for medical reasons. The Hospital Homebound teacher works with elementary and secondary students who have not been allocated support teacher time through a special needs designation. Students may be absent due to a non-contagious illness or they may be recovering from surgery or an injury. Instruction is provided in Ridge-Meadows Hospital or in the student's home.

How does Hospital Homebound support work?

The Hospital Homebound teacher provides direct instruction and support to students, with the goal of helping them return to class with as little interruption to their education as possible. The teacher also helps students maintain connections with the people and programs at their school. While receiving Hospital Homebound support, students continue to be registered at their school and in their classes. Students work on the core academic subjects. They often use the same materials and complete many of the same assignments as their classmates, although some adaptations may be necessary depending on the child's illness. Students typically receive two to three hours of support each week.

When can a student be referred?

Homebound students qualify for support if they are absent from school for 10 consecutive school days. Students who are hospitalized can be referred upon admittance to Ridge-Meadows Hospital.

How do I refer my son or daughter?

Contact your child's teacher, counsellor, or administrator. He/she will complete the Learning Services referral form. A physician's authorization form is also required (available at the school). The Redesigned Curriculum at Maple Ridge Elementary



How has the curriculum been redesigned & how does this benefit student learning?

The BC curriculum has been redesigned to support the changing world students are entering. The redesigned curriculum is student-centred and flexible, maintains a focus on literacy and numeracy skills, and includes Aboriginal perspectives.

Kindergarten to Grade 10 teachers are already using the new curriculum in all our schools. The redesigned curriculum for Grade 11 and 12 is being fully implemented this September.

The Redesigned Curriculum at Maple Ridge Elementary

Why does collaboration have a prominent role in the redesigned curriculum?

he ability to work effectively with others has become a critically important skill for career and life success. "Coordinating with others" is listed as one of the 10 skills to thrive by the World Economic Forum.

The Communication core competency highlights the importance of effective collaboration by focusing on the development of students' listening skills, students' ability to engage in formal and informal conversation, and their ability to generate and share ideas. When students work together to accomplish goals in areas such as inquiry, problem-solving, and community projects, they incorporate information from multiple sources of knowledge, perspectives, and experiences. Students learn to appreciate different perspectives and also learn to build consensus. As a result, the creativity and quality of the solutions students propose are both enhanced.

The relational importance of learning for all students is also captured by the First Peoples' Principles of Learning, which recognize that learning is a highly social process that builds relationships within the family and the community. Ultimately, this emphasis on relationship "reinforces a way of being in the world that helps shape our actions, as we think about how our actions affect those around us."







Core Competencies: What are they and why are they in the new curriculum?

The new curriculum centres around the following three core competency areas: communication, personal and social, thinking. They are sets of intellectual, personal, and social and emotional proficiencies that all students need to develop in order to engage in deep learning and life-long learning. Competencies are evident in every area of learning and in every grade, and come into play when students become actively engaged in their learning. During the school year, students will have an opportunity to self-assess their proficiencies in these core competencies.
