LUNCHTIME PROGRAM FOR STUDENTS

No documentation is required, and the ancestry can go back several generations. Ministry of Education funding is provided to support the success of all Aboriginal students through culturally appropriate educational programs and services.

We encourage all students of First Nations, Metis, or Inuit Ancestry to complete a selfidentification form as this allows you to access various supports and programs during the school year if you wish.
